

### Government Initiatives

#### Vande Bharat train to Coimbatore

We have represented to Ministry of Railways to add more coaches in Vande Bharat train running between Coimbatore and Chennai. However, due to the limited number of coaches, many passengers from this region are unable to secure reservations and are often forced to resort to other modes of travel, which significantly increases their travel costs.

We requested to the Union Railway Minister to consider adding more coaches to the Vande Bharat train between Coimbatore and Chennai at the earliest. Such a step will greatly benefit the business community and the public at large in this region.

In a letter addressed to Shri R N Singh, General Manager, Southern Railway, our Chamber also appealed to double the number of coaches from 8 to 16 to Vande Bharat Express running between Coimbatore and Chennai. We mentioned that the Chennai –

Coimbatore – Chennai route is the busiest intra-state flight route in India, offering the highest number of daily flights and seats availability between the state capital and the second-largest city in Tamil Nadu. More than 2750 flight tickets are sold across 14 flights between Coimbatore and Chennai every day and the fares range between Rs 4000 and sometimes even at Rs 18,000 per ticket one way. Since the journey to Chennai is planned two to three days in advance by many people, the ticket in Vande Bharat train are never available even in Tatkal Scheme.

#### **GST Reforms**

The 56th GST Council Meeting was held on 3rd September 2025 under the Chairmanship of union Finance Minister. The "Next gen GST Reforms" was announced reducing GST tax rates.

The simplification of GST into two tax slabs of 5% and 18%, effective from 22nd September 2025, is a

landmark reform. By reducing the tax burden on essential goods and services, these changes will directly benefit the common citizen while also empowering our MSMEs and small entrepreneurs, who form the backbone of the Indian economy. With every day consumables becoming more affordable, domestic consumption will rise sharply, giving fresh impetus to economic growth and helping India further strengthen its position as one of the world's fastest-growing economies.

We thanked honourable Prime Minster and also Union Finance Minister for announcing these GST reforms.

A Press Note was also issued appreciating the efforts of Central Government.

#### **M&SEF Council**

The meetings of the Micro and Small Enterprises Facilitation Council were held on 22nd and 23rd September 2025 (through Webinar) under the Chairmanship of Shri L Nirmalraj I.A.S, Micro and Small Enterprises Facilitation Council and Industries Commissioner and Director of Industries and Commerce, Chennai. 205 cases were taken up for hearing. Judgments will be issued when finalized and the balance cases were adjourned for the next meeting. As Member of the above Council, Shri N Pradeep, Hon. Secretary attended the above meetings representing our Chamber

### Address by Shri Vikranth Sakthi, Guidance Tamil Nadu

Mr. Vikranth, representing Guidance Tamil Nadu, addressed our members on the topic "Invest in Tamil Nadu – A Strategic Approach to Prosperity, Industrial Approvals & Business Support." He began his presentation by providing an overview of the history of Guidance Tamil Nadu, the state's nodal investment promotion agency, and explained how it has been playing a pivotal role in accelerating business growth and industrial progress across the state.

He highlighted Tamil Nadu's rapid strides in emerging sectors, particularly the Electronics, Semiconductor, and Electric Vehicle (EV) industries, noting with pride that Tamil Nadu has earned recognition as the EV Capital of India. He also emphasized the growing importance of the Global Capability Centers (GCC) ecosystem in the state, which has positioned Tamil Nadu as a hub for innovation, technology, and business services.

Mr. Vikranth further mentioned that Tamil Nadu is today ranked among the Top 10 Global Data Center destinations, underlining the state's strong digital infrastructure and investor-friendly environment. He explained the salient features of the Tamil Nadu Data Centre Policy 2021, which provides a clear roadmap for attracting investments in the data center sector while supporting sustainable and technology-driven growth.

The session also covered Tamil Nadu Government's initiatives in skilling and approvals. He spoke about the Naan Mudhalvan Skilling Platform, which equips the workforce with industry-ready skills, ensuring a seamless supply of talent to meet the evolving demands of various sectors. In addition, he explained how the Single Window Portal has been designed to simplify and fast-track approvals at every stage of business and industrial startups, making Tamil Nadu one of the most efficient and investor-friendly destinations in the country.

He also introduced "Bizz Buddy", an industrial helpdesk created by the Government of Tamil Nadu, which serves as an online grievance redressal platform for industries and investors. He urged members to make the best use of this initiative for resolving issues and obtaining timely support in their business ventures.

Concluding his address, Mr. Vikranth extended an invitation to all our members to actively participate in the upcoming Investment Conclave scheduled to be held in Coimbatore in October 2025. He emphasized that the conclave would provide unparalleled opportunities to connect with policymakers, industry leaders, and global investors, thereby opening new avenues for growth and collaboration.

The session was highly informative, offering members valuable insights into the opportunities available in Tamil Nadu's fast-growing industrial and technological landscape, and reaffirmed the state's position as a leading destination for investment and prosperity.

 To declare Coimbatore as a headquarters for a railway division in Southern Railways



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

Our Vice President Shri S Natarajan and Hon. Secretary, Shri N Pradeep attended the Annual General Body Meeting and CIAMSME Book Release function of Chinnavedampatti Industrial Association (CIA) held on 30th August 2025

#### Letter to Joint Commissioner of State Taxes

Our Vice Presidents Shri C Dorairaj and Shri S Natarajan met Shri A Swaminathan, Joint Commissioner of State Taxes (Intelligence) on 1st September 2025 and invited him to visit our Chamber and address our members to solve the problems of E-Invoice and E-Way bill and also for conduct of awareness program for our members

Based on this meeting with Shri A Swaminathan, Joint Commissioner of State Taxes (Intelligence) our Chamber organized a special meeting on "Clarifications in E-Invoice and E-Way Bills."

President Shri Rajesh B. Lund welcomed the gathering, and Vice President Shri S. Natarajan outlined the purpose of the meeting, highlighting the importance of gaining clarity on documentation, penalties, and compliance procedures.

Shri A. Swaminathan, Joint Commissioner, Tamil Nadu State Taxes, addressed the members with valuable insights on the latest updates in E-Invoice and E-Way Bills. He emphasized that business entities should proactively understand and comply with these requirements, instead of waiting until issues are raised by GST authorities. He explained that the government is continuously updating notifications in line with evolving business practices and clarified that penalties are levied only in cases where documents are not genuine.

He further stressed that with digitalization, both E-Invoices and E-Way Bills can be conveniently generated online without visiting the office. Shri Swaminathan urged members to avoid assumptions, manual errors, and mistakes in transportation charges, and assured that penalties can only be imposed strictly as per the provisions of law.

Mr. Naresh Kumar H. Vyas, Deputy Commissioner, Tamil Nadu State Taxes, made a detailed presentation covering practical issues faced by businesses and provided clarifications on key aspects such as:

#### 1. E-Way Bill

- · Applicability and exemptions
- · Validity and cancellation procedures
- · Case studies and model examples
- · Generation process
- · Penalties for non-generation
- · Inspection, verification, and detention procedures
- · Unblocking of E-Way Bill generation
- · New features and required documents

#### 2. E-Invoice

- · Concept and framework
- · Issues faced by suppliers and buyers
- Process flow and documentation
- Scenarios and advantages of E-Invoice
- · Compliance and efficiency improvements
- Implications for taxpayers
- · Invoice Registration Portal (IRP) and number
- Mapping with GSTR-1

The detailed explanations provided by Shri A. Swaminathan and Shri Naresh Kumar H. Vyas on overcoming compliance challenges and avoiding penalties were highly appreciated by all participants. The interactive session also addressed numerous queries raised by members, making it a very enriching experience.

Members expressed their appreciation to the Chamber for organizing such a comprehensive and insightful program, the first of its kind with in-depth presentations on the subject.

Members of Chamber and affiliated Associations attended the meeting in large number besides our Vice President, Shri C Dorairaj.

#### "Al in Business" Seminar

The Chamber, in collaboration with the **Computer Society of India**, organized a seminar on "AI in Business" on **22nd August 2025** at Chamber Towers.

President Shri Rajesh B. Lund delivered the Welcome Address, introducing the keynote speakers Dr. Venkatesan Lakshminarasimhan, Chairman, Computer Society of India – Coimbatore Chapter, and Ms. Divya Krish, Director, E-Faws Tech Services Pvt. Ltd. In his address, he highlighted how AI is transforming business by automating tasks, saving time, and driving innovation.

**Dr. Venkatesan Lakshminarasimhan,** in his keynote, spoke about the growing importance of AI and its significant impact on the contemporary business landscape. He explained how AI tools can enhance efficiency across various business functions such **as Marketing, Finance, HR, Customer Service, Accounts, Design, and Video Editing,** and demonstrated several relevant tools.

**Ms. Divya Krish** gave live demonstrations of a wide range of AI applications beneficial for business operations, including:

She explained how these tools can be effectively applied in day-to-day business activities to improve efficiency and save time.

The seminar was highly beneficial to all members, who also requested the Chamber to organize similar programs in the future. An engaging interaction session followed, where participants raised queries on practical applications of AI in business, which were addressed by Dr. Venkatesan Lakshminarasimhan and Ms. Divya Krish.

The meeting was well attended by large number of members (200) besides our Vice Presidents, Shri C Dorairaj and Dr. K Annamalai.

The session concluded with a Vote of Thanks proposed by Hon. Secretary Shri N. Pradeep.

### Mr. Balu from Uyir Addressed our Members on "Naan Uyir Kaavalan"

Mr. Balu, representing Uyir, addressed our members on the inspiring topic "Naan Uyir Kaavalan". He explained in detail about Naan Uyir Kaavalan, an ambitious public engagement initiative designed to build a strong road safety culture across Coimbatore district.

He highlighted that Uyir's vision is to create an accident-free Coimbatore, where every life on the road is valued and protected. To achieve this, Naan Uyir Kaavalan seeks to actively involve citizens, institutions, and government bodies in a unified effort to reduce road accidents.

Mr. Balu announced that during the first week of

October 2025, nearly 10 lakh people across Coimbatore will take a solemn oath pledging their commitment to road safety. This historic mass participation is expected to mark a turning point in Coimbatore's journey toward becoming a model city for accident-free roads.

He elaborated on how this vision can be realized by:

45 colleges are invited for this and 4000 drivers are taking training in Road Safety measures.

- Integrating Government Departments Ensuring active coordination between police, transport, highways, health, and other related departments to enforce safety measures effectively.
- Community Participation Encouraging residents, students, businesses, and social organizations to become stakeholders in promoting safe road practices.
- Creating Awareness Conducting continuous campaigns, workshops, and outreach programs to instill the importance of road discipline and safety.
- Sustaining Engagement Making road safety not just a campaign but a way of life, carried forward by every citizen.

He strongly insisted that our members join hands with Uyir in this noble mission, emphasizing that collective responsibility and consistent efforts alone can bring about an accident-free Coimbatore.

### A Talk on "Derivatives – Concept and Application"

Immediately after the Governing Council meeting on 8th September 2025 Dr. K Annamalai, Vice President, delivered an insightful address to our members on the topic "Derivatives – Concept and Application". During his presentation, he explained in detail how derivatives serve as powerful financial instruments that can be applied in multiple ways within the business and investment landscape.

He highlighted the three major applications of derivatives:

 Hedging Risks – Derivatives help businesses and investors mitigate the impact of adverse price fluctuations in commodities, currencies, or financial assets. By entering into derivative contracts, market participants can safeguard against potential losses and ensure greater stability in operations and investments.

- 2. Speculation on Asset Movements Dr. K Annamalai explained how derivatives provide opportunities to benefit from anticipated price movements in assets without the need for actual ownership. This enables investors to strategically position themselves in the market, based on informed analysis and projections.
- 3. Leveraging Positions Through derivatives, investors can control large positions with comparatively smaller capital outlays. This leverage, while carrying risks, can significantly enhance potential returns when managed with prudence and discipline.

To make the session more engaging, he gave interesting real-life examples from commodity markets, stock indices, and even currency fluctuations. These illustrations helped members clearly understand how derivative strategies are applied in everyday business situations and investment decisions.

In addition, he briefly elaborated on the functioning of Futures and Options trading, underlining their importance as the most widely used forms of derivative instruments. He explained how futures contracts create binding obligations for both buyers and sellers at predetermined prices and dates, thereby reducing uncertainty. Similarly, he described options as flexible instruments that grant the right, but not the obligation, to buy or sell an asset, making them suitable for both conservative risk management strategies and dynamic trading opportunities.

The session was well-received by the members, as it not only clarified fundamental concepts but also shed light on practical applications relevant to businesses, traders, and investors alike. His presentation, enriched with examples and simplified explanations, encouraged members to explore how derivatives could be strategically integrated into their operations to better manage risks and optimize financial outcomes. Meeting was well attended by our members, office bearers and students from leading Educational Institutions.

#### Removal of waste in Nehru Nagar – CRPF Road

We have appealed to Mr. Jenkin, Vice President, Block Development Officer, Periyanaicken Palayam Panchayat to arrange for immediate and complete removal of the piled-up debris in Nehru Nagar, CRPF Camp Road causing public health hazards.

Also requested to put a structured and regular waste collection mechanism in the said locality. To install CCTV cameras and cautionary signboards at vulnerable points to deter public dumping of waste.

We have also pointed out that timely and effective action by the Government will bring immense relief to the community and restore cleanliness and hygiene to the area.

#### Si'Tarc Testing Laboratory – Recognition

Chamber appealed to the Honourable union Minister of Consumer Affairs Food and Public Distributors, New Delhi to accord BIS recognition of Si'Tarc Testing Laboratory at Coimbatore. We have pointed out to the Minster that the Pump industry relies heavily on Si'Tarc for product testing and certification with engineering exports from Coimbatore exceeding Rs. 2,000/- crores annually. We mentioned that Si'Trac has applied for recognition of its lab and we urged the minister to process this application speedily and accord BIS recognition to avoid disruption that may lead to economic setback and job losses.

Early BIS recognition of Si'Trac will ensure uninterrupted certification support for industries, bolster exports, and sustain economic growth in this key manufacturing hub.

Shri C Dorariraj and Shri S Natarajan, Vice Presidents anchored the entire event.



#### Rally and Road Show on Electric Vehicles

M/s. Roots Industries, Coimbatore organized impactful initiative that highlights Coimbatore's contribution to the growing EV ecosystem held on 9th September 2025.

Our Vice President Shri C Dorairaj and Hon Secretary, Shri N Pradeep attended the event representing our Chamber. They Offered felicitation to Dr. S. Chandrasekar, Founder Trustee & Vice President, Society for Smart E-Mobility (SSEM), and the entire team.

### Representation to District Collector, Coimbatore

Our Chamber represented to our District Collector the serves in convenience caused due to the prolonged delay in the construction of Saibaba Colony flyover and service roads on MTP Road. We pointed out that due to the absence of proper service roads, coupled with the presence of auto stands, street vendors, shops, EB poles and potholes, has created a daily traffic bottleneck. Commuters are forced to take long detours, while residents, schoolchildren, senior citizens and patients face untold hardship. Ambulances too are unable to reach hospitals on time, putting lives at risk.

We requested the District Collector to take immediate action for completion of flyover and service road works and also implement a temporary traffic management to being relief to the people.

Our President Shri Rajesh B Lund welcomed the gathering and thanked Shri S Jaikumar for his gracious presence, and emphasized that the update on the 56th GST Council announcements would greatly help members understand the latest changes and its impact on business

Our Vice President, Shri S Natarajan, highlighted the landmark judgment on GST Notices delivered by Hon'ble Justice Shri G R Swaminathan of the Chennai High Court, directing that taxpayers must be served with physical GST notices. This judgment was delivered in a case argued by Shri S Jaikumar himself, making it a truly significant milestone.

In his address, Shri S Jaikumar expressed his gratitude to the Chamber and assured that he would continue to extend his services in the future. He gave a brief insight into GST 2.0, aimed at reducing taxes and boosting purchasing power, and explained the revised GST slabs of 5% and 18%, along with 40% on sin products. He further mentioned that he and his partner, Shri Nitin Chopra, would together provide refined insights beyond what was officially announced in the GST Council updates

Following this, Shri Nitin Chopra delivered a comprehensive presentation on the sector-wise rate changes, covering Food, Agriculture & Fertilizers, Energy, Textiles, Healthcare, FMCG, Mechanical Products, Paper Industry, Leather, and Transport. He also detailed the changes in services, including actionable claims at 40%, local delivery services through e-commerce, grooming and beauty services, insurance (life, health, and reinsurance), and other reforms. Importantly, he informed members that the due date for filing appeals against orders communicated before April 1, 2026, would be June 30, 2026.

He further elaborated on the provisions under the Finance Act, 2025, explained the differences between old and new rates, clarified proposals not yet notified, and supported his points with practical examples.

Later, Shri S Jaikumar highlighted the pros and cons of the latest GST announcements and, in a generous gesture, offered to provide his services free of cost to Chamber members, if recommended by the Chamber

Before delivering the vote of thanks, our Hon. Secretary Shri N Pradeep noted that the session was highly informative and extremely well-attended, with the hall filled to capacity.

Demonstrating the keen interest of our members, he expressed delight that at the conclusion of the meeting, Shri S Jaikumar also offered to conduct a dedicated workshop for MSMEs at no cost, purely to support and strengthen the industry-a gesture warmly appreciated by all.

On behalf of the Chamber and its members, Shri N Pradeep extended heartfelt thanks to Shri S Jaikumar, Mr. Nitin Chopra, and the entire Swamy Associates team for their continued guidance and support.

He thanked all the member companies for deputing their executives.

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






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### SERVICE is not equal to COMMUNICATE

N the last decade, the Indian digital revolution is unbelievable and astronomical. Few years back, none would have dreamt the way the UPI has revolutionised Indian fiscal landscape. Likewise, can anyone imagine today, the GST eco-system without the GST Network? GSTN to GST is IRCTC to rail transport. Truly laudable. Absolutely indispensable.

From enrolling a person as a registrant to the stages of recovery of tax dues, the GST portal is the digital brain that reigns the GST eco-system, making the department and taxpayer as two compelling terminals at the two ends of the GST spectrum.

The digitalised version of this new tax regime has necessitated every business, be it tiny, small or medium, to have a consultant from the very stage of creating a username and password to access the portal to claiming refunds and accessing all of the services required to be availed under GST. The divide between the portal and the taxpayer has been widened by the presence of intermediary consultants. The dependency has often resulted in some crucial and impacting misses, which are sometimes costly and many times deadly but always involuntary. More fatal has been the service of notices and orders ONLY through GST portal through process of mere 'uploading' not followed by any other mode of communication.

In such situations, High courts in the country has played a key and instrumental role, weighing more on principles of equity and fairness and natural justice, not to mention the clarity brought to legislative wisdom through prescribed role of interpreting the law. The eight years of GST has flooded the high courts of the country with writ remedy, 90 percent of which had the cause of action, omitting to notice (verb) the communication/notice (noun) or order on GST Portal.

The issue has been addressed in different ways from challenging the vires of the means of services, to absence of power to GST portal to be the carrier and various judicial minds have approached the issue differently. While there are judgements favouring the Revenue, holding that making order available on portal is "tendering" and it is the bounden duty of the taxpayer to verify the portal, there are taxpayerfriendly judgments upholding the view that though the service through portal is sufficient but not effective and such service should be accompanied by other modes, the modes are alternate and not cumulative etc.

In a recent judgement, the Madurai bench of the Hon'ble High Court - 2025-TIOL-1512-HC-MAD-GSThas

gone deep into the roots of the issue, and has rendered a decision, which would go a long way to redress the cup of woes of the taxpayer and would give a reprieve to the ones who had missed the bus.



While agreeing with the vires of Section 169 and its a proper mode of service, the judgment focuses on relevant date for reckoning limitation for filing the appeal. The court has found that there is difference between the words "service" under Section 169 and "communicate" under Section 107 to conclude that the uploading of an order on the GSTN portal could be a proper service but the limitation under Section107 would start from the date of "communication". The Court has also amplified that "communication" is abipartite affair and "service" would become "communication" if the authority reaches out to the assessee. The Court also held that, as its mandatory for the authority to upload on the portal, there is no obligation cast on the assessee to access the portal. In fine, the court held that the uploading on portal would be sufficient to satisfy Section 169 with regard to "service", but the limitation period under Section 107 to file the appeal would start only from the date of "communication".

On a parting note, the Court has also taken cognisance of the digital divide and consequent issues faced by small and medium tax payers in specified scenario and took the practical difficulties and possible resolutions cited by the Petitioner on record and has directed the appropriate authorities who don such affairs, to take note of the same.

The judgment, is categorical in attributing its judicial wisdom to rule of practical interpretation, and has relied on the Judgment of Supreme Court in Southern Electricity Supply Co Ltd Vs. Sri Seeta Ram Rice Mill 2012, 2 SCC 108 to hold that an interpretation which upon application of the provisions at the ground reality, would frustrate the very law should not be accepted against the common sense view, which will further such application.

To us, this rendition should go into the annals of legal interpretation not only as one of the most emphaticand empathetic, reasonable and solution-oriented judgement but also the one rendered under theauspices of Article 226, both in letter as well as in spirit.

- Reducing GST reduces upfront capital cost of trucks, which lowers freight rates per tonne-km.
- This has a cascading effect. It will lead to cheaper movement of agrigoods,

### cement, steel, FMCG, and e-commerce deliveries. It will reduce inflationary pressures.

- Supports MSME truck owners, who form a large share of India's road transport sector.
- Cheaper trucks directly help reduce logistics cost, improving export competitiveness.

### Tractor parts reduced to 5%

- India is one of the world's largest tractor markets;
   GST cut will push demand in both domestic and export segments.
- The components for tractor manufacturing like tyres, gears etc will also be taxed at 5% only.
- Ancillary MSMEs making engines, tyres, hydraulic pumps, and spare parts will benefit from higher production. The GST Cut will also strengthen India's positioning as a global tractor manufacturing hub.

#### Fruits, Vegetables & Food Processing

- Prepared/Preserved Vegetables, Fruits, Nuts (12% to 5% GST)

# Banking Central | Why investors must not ignore RBI's warnings on crypto

The RBI has been warning for years, flagging the role of cryptocurrency in laundering, terror finance and tax evasion

retired Kanpur-based banker, Anil Singh Chauhan, lost Rs 2.52 crore — his life's savings, loans and even family jewellery — in just over a month, falling prey to an elaborate crypto fraud, dressed up as cryptocurrency trading, reports have said.

A stranger's text turned into chats, then video calls and soon, the lure of quick riches. Chauhan trusted an app but what he got in return was financial ruin.

In a country without a crypto regulatory framework, investors like Chauhan do not have many regulatory options. And Chauhan's is not an isolated tale of investor gullibility. It is the predictable outcome of India's tolerance of a financial menace that should have checked long ago.

The absence of regulation hasn't deterred investors. Crypto continues to thrive and it is not confined to big cities. Tier2 and 3 and even smaller towns have been taken in and if reports are anything to go by, millions are being traded in bitcoin, ethereum, solana and other such tokens.

Crypto is sold as the future of money but in reality, it is a speculative casino where the dice is always loaded against the small saver. Price swings make the stock

market look tame; its scams are not exceptions but the very ecosystem.

### Red flags are up and fluttering

In fact, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has been warning for years. It has flagged its role in laundering, terror finance and tax evasion, and reminded us that no central bank can safeguard a system it doesn't control.

Governor Sanjay Malhotra has been blunt: crypto is not money, not an asset, not anything that deserves legitimacy.

An estimated over two crore Indians, many of them financially unsophisticated, are exposed.

The government's 30 percent tax and one percent TDS in 2022 gave crypto a veneer of official sanction without offering an inch of investor protection. No licensing of exchanges. No meaningful KYC. No recourse for victims beyond an FIR that goes nowhere. Compare this with SEBI's tight grip on equities. In crypto, there is no watchdog — only wolves.

Globally, regulators have moved. The EU's framework forces disclosure, reserves, and anti-money laundering compliance. Even the US, often fractured on regulation, has gone after crypto intermediaries with lawsuits and penalties.



Honesty makes no impossible demands upon the resources of a businessman. An honest man cannot have dishonest kinsmen. 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
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
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### How five forces will shape the future of work

rganisations will face multiple challenges in managing both the talent pool and the way theywork



A friend who has started a company in the area of marketing analytics was telling me that he had to make a big shift during Covid and that change has staved. His company has at any time around 50 full-time employees. All of them operate from home. #WFH seems to have worked for him. I guizzed him about how he is monitoring his people (when

business leaders are all making a clarion call for #ReturnToOffice). He explained that he has a great team that is committed and hardworking; his business was thriving and he has no plans for getting his 50 employees back to office, especially because they are spread all over the country. If you thought this was happening in the US or Europe let me tell you that this is happening in India. I am sure there are many more such small companies all around us.

If the future is going to be #WFH and #GigWorking, how are large organisations going to manage their talent pool?

Rishad Tobaccowala is an ad industry veteran. He was one of the keynote speakers at the Indian ad industry conclave, the Goafest, a decade or so ago. In his new book Rethinking Work, Rishad presents the 'seismic changes in the where, when and why of work'. In the introduction chapter he lays down the shifts: Generational Shifts (four or five generations are going to working in the same firm at the same time, each with their own mindset and expectations); technology (our work is going to be AI-infused and every job will change); marketplaces (talent is going to be in a free flow form just as products are sold on platforms talent too will be sold on platforms); new ways of working (demographics, technology and marketplaces are going to create new ways of working); and the long term impact of Covid (not only did Covid create new paradigms as far as work is concerned, it also created new emotional rewiring of employees). These five forces have thrown open several questions about work: who will people work for; what will organisations look like; why will people work, where will people work; when will people work; how will leadership change. These questions are addressed by Rishad over three sections.

The first section is about the forces that are driving the great thinking. The societal shifts, the creation of talent marketplaces, the gig work economy and how Covid was just a catalyst. The movement was happening and Covid acted as a rapid accelerator.

The second section looks at what work will become. How companies will have to get used to fractional employees, how machines (often AI-powered) will have to work with humans or the other way around, how the office is today unbundled and how there is a need for the old managers to give way to new leaders.

The third section is about how companies can prepare for the future of work. There is a need to reimagine the company in the light of the new paradigms. Work force will need to be retrained. Structures will have to be redesigned. Financials will need to be recalculated. Finally there will be a need to re-vision the work-rippled world.

The book is largely focused on the US market and the examples are also drawn from the US ecosystem. Not all of them will apply to the Indian organisations. We are seeing a reverse movement happening in India with most large companies moving back to #WorkFromOffice. In the light of this movement, I was left wondering how valid the conclusions of the book were for a market like India. Then I heard about my friend's company with 50 people. Successful. Profitable. Growing.

Instead of dismissing the conclusions from the book as too Utopian, I am tempted to say that the book is futuristic from an Indian stand point. But the indications are clear. Many companies in India are struggling to bring the workforce back to office. It is likely that many companies will have to settle for a three days office, two days wherever policy, at least in several sectors. If this is going to be the norm, how should companies prepare for this, what processes will need to be redesigned, what are the upsides of this movement? Will gig workers become a permanent part of any workforce?

The book asks many questions and opens many new ideas for us to ponder over.







### Coimbatore industries welcome GST rate revision

Industries in various manufacturing segments in Coimbatore district have welcomed the revision of

The Indian Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Coimbatore, president Raiesh Lund said the two-tax slab system of 5% and 18%, effective from September 22, is aimed at reducing complexity and promoting ease of compliance. The reduction of rates for paper and leather good and agri products is expected to boost growth and consumption and enhance India's position as a global agri export hub, he said.

The Laghu Udyog Bha-rati (LUB) Tamil Nadu said the simplified GST structure will enhance transparency, reduce compliance burden, and foster a business-friendly ment. This will lead to increased competitiveness of Indian MSMEs both, domestically and globally. It will also improve cash

flows and boost competitiveness of the MSMEs, it said. According to M. Ra-veendran, president of the Coimbatore Compressor Industry Association. while reduction of the rates is a welcome move. the input tax credit system should be simplified, the duty for job work should be reduced to 5 %, and the penalty for minor mistakes in the documentation

should be reduced. The AEPC vice-chairman, A. Sakthivel, said the GST reforms announced by the government mark a big step in making India a developed economy. The decision to fast-track export refunds within seven days, extend provisional refunds under the inverted duty structure, and allow GST refunds below ₹1000 will bring timely relief to exporters, ease liquidity constraints, and further streamline supply chains, he said.

The South India Hosiery Manufacturers Association said the revision of GST rates for textile industry availability to the garment

industry.
According to Openend Spinning Mills Association president G. Arulmozhi, loering of GST to 5 % for MMF sector will increase consumption of polyester and viscose fibre by the textile mills.

Prabhu Dhamodharan, convenor of the Indian Texpreneurs Federation. said lower GST rates, removal of duty inversion, and simplified compliance for the textile sector will boost consumption, improve ease of doing business, and strengthen industry competitiveness and global edge. "For the MMF textile sector, this reform is especially significant. The sector has the potential to be the growth driver of the Indian textile industry. In developed markets, India's share in cotton apparel stands at 10%-12%, while in MMF apparel it is only 2%-3%, highlighting the significant headroom for growth," he

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
